Dear Friends,


I hope that your 2016 is off to a great start. Here at Hope Through Health we have begun a year filled with progress and opportunity. In August 2015, we launched a new Maternal and Child Health program building on and expanding our decade of experience delivering comprehensive HIV/AIDS care. This new Maternal and Child Health program continues to show impressive early results, some of which are highlighted on page 4. Thanks to your support, Hope Through Health is now serving nearly 2,000 patients living with HIV and has extended care to a population of 30,000 through our Maternal and Child Health program. We are pleased to share an update on the progress that we are making together, through this quarterly report.

Here are some highlights from the third quarter of fiscal year 2016:

- In January 2016, Hope Through Health conducted a second-annual household survey, six months post-launch of our new Maternal and Child Health program. The data from this survey of over 1300 households is currently being analyzed by our research team and partners.
- In January 2016, Hope Through Health announced a partnership with the organization Muso. We are honored to work in collaboration with Muso to build a stronger evidence base for a model of proactive care across multiple settings. We're looking forward to sharing lessons learned with each other.
- In February 2016, Hope Through Health established an official presence in Togo's capital, Lomé. Hope Through Health's former Program Director, Andrew Lopez, is now Chief Partnership Officer, spearheading efforts to support the Government of Togo around health policy development on the national level.

We would not have been able to expand our impact and achieve these results without your unwavering support. We are deeply grateful for your partnership, which has allowed us to move ever closer to our vision of high quality healthcare for all in the underserved nation of Togo. GENDER-BASED PROGRAMMING | Prioritizing services for women and children as the most effective means to strengthening entire communities.

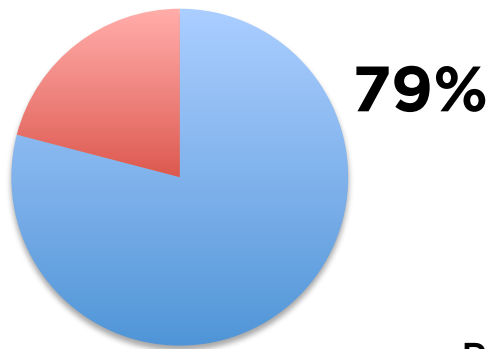
EVIDENCE-BASED PRACTICE | Implementing medical and public health interventions through decision-making based on the best available evidence and information.

SELECTED INDICATORS

Hope Through Health employs a Monitoring, Evaluation, and Quality improvement dashboard, designed to enable our team to easily analyze data and make program improvements in real time. Hope Through Health also conducts an annual household survey which allows us to estimate population size and analyze impact in terms of population coverage. As a result our coverage rates may change from year to year as population estimates change. Here is a selection of indicators for the first eight months (August-March) of our new Maternal and Child Health Program highlighting our core impact areas of access, timeliness and quality. This data reflects population estimates collected in January 2016.

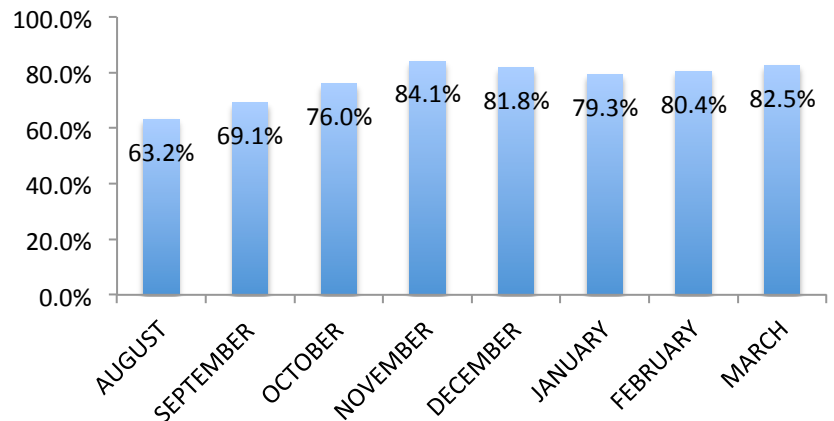
Percent of Children Under Five Receiving Care



ACCESS: In the first eight months of the Maternal and Child Health Program **5,334 children** out of an estimated area of 6,727 children were treated by Community Health Workers and at public clinics.

TIMELINESS: In March 2016, 82.5% of cases were treated within the first 72 hours following symptom onset.

QUALITY: In March 2016, Community Health Worker adherence to clinical protocols was measured at 96% through direct observation by a supervisor.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHT: EMPOWERING TRADITIONAL HEALERS

In Togo, traditional healers are respected elders who use a wide variety of methods to remedy illness, ranging from herbs and local plants to prayers and ceremonies. Hope Through Health's 2014 household survey shows that a significant percentage of mothers (ranging from 3% to 14% by site) first seek health advice from a traditional healer. There are many reasons why mothers choose to take their children to a traditional healer to receive care. She might believe that traditional medicine works better than other medicine; she might feel pressure from family members to visit a traditional healer, or she might choose this option because it is less expensive than going to the health center.

Hope Through Health recognizes that the practice of traditional medicine can sometimes be a barrier to receiving quality healthcare, however we see traditional healers themselves as an untapped population of change makers who, through engagement and collaboration, can have a significant impact on the improvement of health outcomes of their communities.

In February 2016, Hope Through Health gathered traditional healers for a training that had three main objectives:

- Engage traditional healers in the maternal and child health program active in their community
- Teach traditional healers how to detect danger signs in children under five and pregnant women
- Ensure that traditional healers refer all sick children under five and pregnant women to a community health worker or directly to the health center instead of treating themselves

The training, led by Hope Through Health's Community Health Worker Supervisor, was interactive and involved role-plays and small group activities. Discussions were lively as participants shared experiences of treating—and not treating—community members. In general the participants had a perception of what they had the ability to cure (spiritual problems, for example) and what they did not (malaria, diarrhea, complications in pregnancy). They welcomed the opportunity to learn more and were in favor of a long-term collaboration with Hope Through Health.

At the end of the training, the traditional healers were overwhelmingly grateful that Hope Through Health involved them in the effort of making their community healthier. "Now, we feel considered by the program," one participant expressed. "We understand that we can play an important role."

In the weeks following the training, the Hope Through Health team has already noticed a difference. In the village of Sarakawa, three children have been referred from traditional healers to Community Health Workers. One healer even carried the child himself to the Community Health Worker's house in the middle of the night. The success of the traditional healer training is an example of the important impact of building community buy-in, an essential tenant in the operating principles of Hope Through Health.

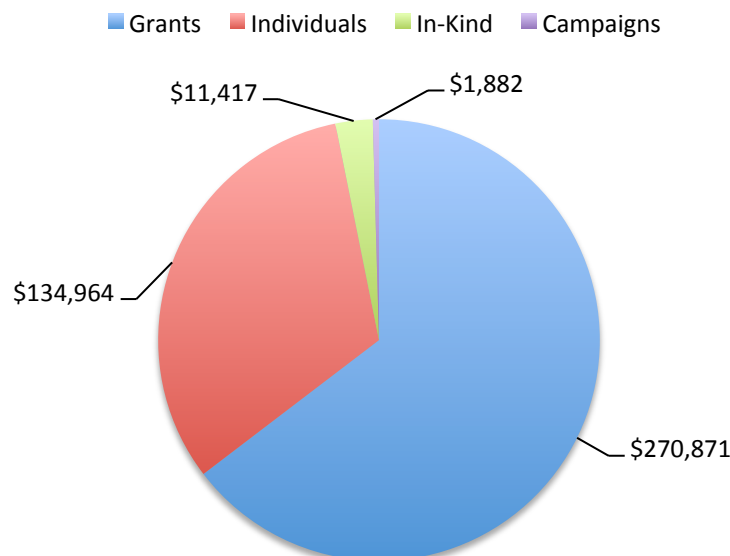
