SIX MONTH PROGRESS REPORT
JULY — DECEMBER 2016

DEAR FRIENDS,

Happy New Year! As we kick off 2017, a new year full of exciting opportunities, I am pleased to share this report describing the progress made over the past six months. In August 2016, Hope Through Health began the second year of our Maternal and Child Health program and in September we celebrated the twelfth year of our flagship HIV program! Both programs continue to show impressive results, some of which are highlighted on page 4. Thanks to your support, Hope Through Health now serves a population of nearly 40,000 people throughout northern Togo. Through our programs, we ensure that women, children and individuals living with HIV have rapid access to the high quality care they deserve. We are pleased to share with you, through this biannual report, an update on the progress that we are making together in our fight to end preventable deaths and ensure health for all, beginning in Togo.

Some highlights from the past six months include:

- It was an honor to stand beside Chelsea Clinton, as she highlighted the work of Hope Through Health, on-stage at the 2016 Clinton Global Initiative Annual Meeting. Chelsea spoke about the progress Hope Through Health has made on behalf of Togo's women and children over the past year. She also announced our new commitment to build a brand new maternity ward in order to continue improving the healthcare services available to women and children in northern Togo.
- In October, we were thrilled to announce that our fundraising goal for that new maternity ward was met, thanks to the generosity of our supporters! In partnership with Construction for Change and the 30/30 Project, Hope Through Health will soon be breaking ground on the construction of a new maternity ward and renovations to an existing clinic, which will serve a population of over 20,000 people on the outskirts of the city of Kara in northern Togo. I look forward to updating you as this project advances.
- In November, Hope Through Health held a working group meeting with key leaders within the Ministry of Health to discuss Hope Through Health's proactive model for integrated community and clinic-based primary health care. Hope Through Health is honored to partner with the Togolese Government to help further their goal of eliminating preventable deaths and ensuring access to high quality healthcare for all.

None of this progress would have been possible without your support. On behalf of our entire team, I wish to express our deepest gratitude for your unwavering commitment to transforming the health and lives of individuals in the underserved nation of Togo. Thank you for your continued partnership as we expand our impact in an effort to end preventable deaths in Togo.

At Hope Through Health we care deeply about providing the fastest, highest quality care to the greatest number of patients in an effort to end preventable deaths. To do this, we measure our impact across three key areas: **Access**, **Timeliness** and **Quality**. Hope Through Health collects data on our Key Performance Indicators (KPIs) and supporting indicators in a dynamic Monitoring, Evaluation and Quality Improvement dashboard, designed to enable our team to easily analyze data and make program improvements in real time.

1,822 individuals living with HIV

4,519 HIV consultations

% of people with good adherence to antiretroviral therapy



1,366 of 1,518 people living with HIV on anti-retroviral therapy respected their monthly refill appointments.

% of patients on anti-retroviral therapy with a CD4 count > 350



1,032 of 1,518 HIV patients who are on anti-retroviral therapy had a CD4 count, a measure of immune system strength, greater than 350.

CLINIC UPGRADES

In October, HTH received a shipment of equipment and supplies for three partner public health clinics in Togo. Generously given by IMEC, The Gould Family Foundation and Segal Family Foundation, the donation equipped the previously scarce clinics with hospital and maternity beds, IV stands, scales and sterilizers among many other things.

ULTRASOUND PROGRAM

In Togo, very few pregnant women receive ultrasounds although every woman is recommended to have at least one during their pregnancy. This proves to be a large barrier to the wellbeing of pregnant women and their newborns. This changed when HTH received two portable ultrasound machines generously donated by IMEC, The Gould Family Foundation and Segal Family Foundation. HTH takes the ultrasound machines out to rural sites and tests women who previously did not have access. In the first month of the ultrasound program, 168 women received care!

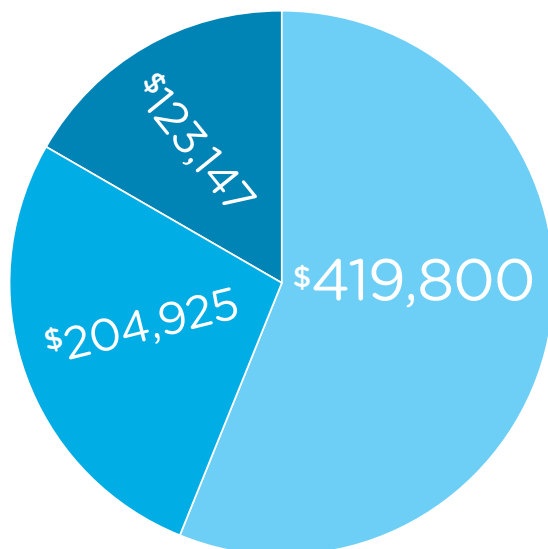
